America's Job Centers of California (AJCCs)

Unemployment Insurance (UI) for Workers

Workers who lost work or income due to the wildfire may be eligible for UI, and the waiting period has been waived for disaster victims.

Earn between \$40-\$450 per week depending on earnings in the past 18 months.

Workers who lost work or income due to the wildfire and are not typically eligible for UI may be eligible for DUA. **DUA covers** jobless and self-employed workers and those whose own business or employer does not pay into the UI system.

Workers must have worked in the disaster area earning their primary income and cannot return to work or perform work or have become head of household.

Benefits are determined based on earnings in previously completed tax year, like UI, but they can also include net selfemployment earnings.

Applications must be submitted by March 10th, 2025 and can request claims starting the week of the disaster or January 12t, where applicable.

- If you became sick or hurt and can't work because of a disaster, you may qualify for State Disability Insurance.
- If you need to care for a family member hurt in the disaster, you may qualify for Paid Family Leave benefits.







Grants Overview


In the past 5 years CERF+ has awarded more than 3 million dollars in direct assistance to 2,000+ craft artists

- Emergency Relief \$3,000 grants to U.S. craft artists who have experienced a practice threatening or serious emergency.





Research & Evaluation: Measuring Impact

- Working with the National Coalition for Arts Preparedness and Emergency Response (NCAPER) and local partners to survey individual artists, performing groups, creative workers, and arts organizations and cultural institutions to understand the full scope of the wildfires' impact

 Initiative identified 189 cultural
 heritage sites potentially impacted
 by the Eaton Fire, and 83 cultural
 heritage sites potentially impacted
